## Meetings Programme

#### March Meeting Report

I said of January's talk about Henry Garnet and the Gunpowder Plot by William Ruff that, "It was an excellent talk, superbly delivered." So was this one. We were treated to a fluent, lively talk entitled "The Sinking of Venice" by Tony Waltham.

Tony Waltham graduated in 1968, with a first degree in geology and a PhD in mining geology. He has lectured at Nottingham Trent University, teaching engineering geology, and is recognised as one of the world experts on karst (a special kind of landscape formed by



the dissolution of soluble rocks such as limestone and dolomite). He is widely published and also edits the *Mercian Geologist*, sits on the board of *Geology Today*, leads geological tours, manages his Geophotos picture library, and lectures on cruise ships.

Subsidence, on a scale such that a large part of a city slowly descends to lower levels, is almost always due to excessive groundwater abstraction with declining water tables that impact on compressible clay. The subsidence can be greatly reduced or stopped (but not reversed) by controlling abstraction and inducing water table rise. Mexico City (home to 21 million people who consume 287 billion gallons of water a year, extracted from the aquifer below the city) holds the records for the amount of subsidence, and Bangkok currently has the greatest rate of sinking. Mexico City has sunk about 30 feet in the last century. The Monumento a la Independeia, built at ground level in 1910 to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Mexico's War of Independence, now requires 23 additional steps to reach its base as the ground has sunk below it.

Whilst Venice has subsided comparatively little, its critical position virtually at sea level now demands expensive remedial engineering works. Much of Venice's subsidence was caused by dewatering, largely



caused by an industrial complex built near Marghera on the edge of the Lagoon, comprising refineries, chemical establishments and metalworking factories. The Porto Marghera and neighbouring Mestre area on Venice mainland turned Italy's "industrial triangle" Milan-Venice-Genoa into an 'industrial quadrangle" with the addition of Marghera. The increased requirements of water for industrial use and drinking water for a growing local population led to the constant extraction of huge amounts of water from deep aquifers below ground and beneath the Lagoon.

A very interesting and educational talk, by an expert on the subject, illustrated by slides explaining the complex issues and also including some beautiful photographs of this unique city. -*Editor*



#### Theatre - 2 Reviews

#### "Love Letters" at the Bonington Theatre, Arnold.

Fourteen of us attended this production. The evening started with beautifully sung music from Les Miserables and by Lloyd Webber, a combination sure to please. Then we got down to the main subject of the evening: a man and a woman sat at a table and read letters that we were given to understand they had, in the play, written to each other, from being young children right through their lives. It was a poignant piece and one that made me think afterwards. His family were not well off but he was given love, discipline and good education from strict but caring parents. Her parents in contrast were wealthy, yes, but they seemed more fond of the bottle than they were of their artistic daughter who was sent to one unsuitable institution after another.

The letters continued through to their adult lives so we could see how wayward the girl was becoming but also how they cared for each other without actually realising it to start with. Lots of meetings were suggested over the years but by then he had become not only a family man but a successful politician with little time at his disposal. So they never really got it together until they were middle-aged and then of course the penny dropped and they were both as keen as the other to meet up again. Sadly though, his life did not really allow her in it and after a largely unfulfilled life which also included drink and drugs, she gradually degenerated and then finally died. He writes one last letter ostensibly to her mother but also for her, pouring out his real feelings. As I said at the beginning, a poignant and thought-provoking piece, well put over by the two actors involved.

#### "Touched" at Nottingham Playhouse.

Another production seen in February by 10 of us, 'Touched' was a sell-out revival (its 40th anniversary), written by local playwright Stephen Lowe and starring the now famous local actress Vicky McClure. Set in 1945 in inner city Nottingham, it depicted the hardships and struggles of three sisters in the 100 days between VE and VJ Day. Costumes, background sounds and sets brought nostalgic reminders to some of us: pretty tea dresses and upswept hair, the kitchen range and wooden ironing board, cigarette smoke wafting over the audience, songs of the period on the radio plus Churchill's announcements and Richard Dimbleby's liberation of Belsen report.

The actors' Nottingham accents and dialect added humour (although strangers to our city may have been a bit lost!); there were also poignant silences and glances adding to the atmosphere of resignation to the fate of families left behind while their loved ones were at war, plus confusion, but some hope for the future. There were touching moments when the disgrace of a pregnancy, the baby having been fathered by an Italian P.O.W. was endured by Sandra, the lead actress. Here, Vicky McClure showed her stage skills in some moving monologues. Her character had lost a little boy in an accident which temporarily made her "touched", both meanings of the title being significant in this play. The 'pregnancy' turned out to be phantom.

The play had mixed reviews from our group, a few of us usually enjoying war-time stories but feeling that the rudimentary home abortion attempt was too dominant. Some of us also felt "empty" at the end; it was certainly dramatic though, showing the sisters and their families high up above Sneinton on VJ Day. The ending of the war with Japan was suggested by a very loud explosion, the Bomb detonated over Nagasaki.

Stephen Lowe had shown the audiences the reality of working class life and the sombre ending of World War Two. So, some light-hearted moments, and a shocking commentary on our life and times.



#### Friday June 2<sup>nd</sup> - How To Handle Later Life with Marion Shoard

Marion Shoard found herself thrown into the world of older people's care in the late 1990s, when her mother went blind and developed dementia. Since then she has been assembling guidance for other people not only about how to find and fund good care, but also in other important areas including housing choices, healthcare rights, transport, social contact, relationships, finance and power of attorney. #### Friday July 7th - Small Island by Little Train: a UK narrow-gauge adventure by Chris Arnot

Narrow-gauge lines were the oddballs of the British railway system. They could get to parts of the UK that main-line trains couldn't and were built on the whims of wealthy men. Chris Arnot has travelled on them to the UK's only official desert, to Britain's second highest mountain, to a steep railway embankment in the wilds of Scotland, and in pitch darkness in coastal Cumbria.
