
TUESDAY 8TH NOVEMBER: PETER ARMITAGE - STONEBRIDGE CITY FARM

Stonebridge City Farm is "a small slice of the countryside in the heart of the city" and if you've never been, Peter's talk might persuade you to. It's an urban farm, offering a safe space for families and the community to enjoy themselves. Established 35 years ago with and for disadvantaged people, it provides support, training and therapeutic interaction with the animals and gardens for the community and visitors. There are multiple volunteering opportunities on the farm providing meaningful work for over 150 volunteers on site each week, many of whom have a mental health challenge or a learning disability. If you have grandchildren there is a wide range of animals to visit, a great play area and a cafe and shop. In the gardens are seasonal plants, produce and herbs, some of which can be purchased from their shop.

TUESDAY 10TH JANUARY: ROGER BROWNE - THE GREAT AMERICAN SONG BOOK



Raconteur, humourist, pianist, singer, director, actor, and writer Roger recounts how Jazz, Minstrel Music, Blues, Opera, Operetta, Musical Theatre, The Two World Wars, The Financial Rollercoasters of the first half of the 20th century and The Golden Age of Radio, were all influencers of, and inspirations for, the great composers of the years between the two wars. Composers such as: George Gershwin, Jerome Kern, Irving Berlin, Cole Porter, Harry Warren, Hoagy Carmichael, and many others, who, between them, wrote thousands of richly melodic masterpieces, with equally memorable lyrics. The output of this period became known as "The Great American Songbook". In this talk, Roger traces the history and music of this genre, so prepare to get your feet tapping.

Revolutionising the Semiconductor industry on Monday 14th November at 10.30 at The University of Nottingham main campus, Physics building.

Don't worry if you're not sure what the semiconductor industry is, you are already beholden to it via your computer, mobile phone, car, washing machine etc, etc, etc! Whether you like it or not you are surrounded by it.

Things have got smaller and smaller, and this "miniaturization" has facilitated blue-sky research and important discoveries in the semiconductor industry. The more you can squeeze onto a chip the cheaper and more amazing things you can do. Professor Patane and her team have just received a £2.9m research award to further their work in this area including the development of a new generation of 2 dimensional semiconductors.

So come and hear how this will affect us all and put us at the forefront of these exciting developments and give the UK a unique capability. Expect your brain to be challenged and your mind to be blown a little.

If Physics worries you, even more reason to come! Their job is to explain this to us in understandable terms

The visit will feature a presentation on the above followed by a tour of the facilities.

GROUP NEWS University Interest Group



Around 30 members of the u3a University Interest Group attended a fascinating presentation on robots and artificial intelligence at Nottingham University's Jubilee campus.

We learnt that robots have gone from science fiction to everyday fact and have enormous potential to enhance human experience. There are currently around 3 million industrial robots that have transformed quality and productivity in the workplace. They are also used in surgery, transport and areas dangerous or difficult for humans to enter, such as nuclear facilities. They are also increasingly used to enhance the lives of those with disabilities - aiding speech and movement and enhancing independence. Indeed everyone is increasingly exposed to such interactions. And, if you don't believe it just ask Alexa or Siri!

We were able to visit the 'cobot' facility (as you will see from the photo on the previous page). A cobot, or collaborative robot, is one intended for direct human robot interaction within a shared space, or where humans and robots are in close proximity. We got up-close and personal with cobots which are being designed to interact with humans and met doglike, catlike and humanlike robots and saw how engaging and versatile they can be. We also gained an insight to the complex algorithms that are necessary for even the simplest of manual tasks and discussed some of the ethical issues that arise around equality, data ownership and privacy.

We all left with plenty of food for thought and a feeling that the title of our tour was right
